Our religious exploration program is using a theme-based curriculum this year. Children and youth are exploring common themes in age-appropriate ways. This approach is helping create multigenerational connections and extending faith development beyond Sunday morning. The following list highlights some of the ways in which what's happening in our religious exploration program is extending beyond the classroom.

- Our children made memory squares that were included in the November asthetics display in the Sanctuary and they also made acts of kindness boxes for members of our community to spread kindness throughout the month of December.
- Our preschool, kindergarten, first, and second graders made ornaments for Babies First.
- Our second and third graders are stitching together soft dog and cat toys that will be donated to a local animal shelter.
- Our fourth and sixth graders are taking the December collections and assembling kits for the men at Second Wind Cottages.

Green Tip from the Environmental Interests Circle

Many appliances, electronics, and other devices in your home consume significant amounts of electricity while unused but plugged in, and many of these can be safely separated from their power source when not in active use. The Natural Resources Defense Council offers a PDF of guidance on identifying your devices with the highest "phantom loads" by meter reading or using a Kill-a-Watt meter (the Smartphone app Dr. Power also provides this information about more than 100,000 devices) and reducing their energy use with assistance from smart power strips, device timers, and adjusted settings.



Application for Pedersen Memorial GA Scholarship

This scholarship was developed using funds donated to FUSIT in memory of Mark Pedersen. Mark loved attending General Assembly (GA) and wanted more members of FUSIT to attend GA as delegates. In his memory, we created this scholarship program to help defray the costs for registration and/or travel to General Assembly for those with financial need.

Each year, no more than up to \$2,000 will be granted to applicants showing financial need.

Application Deadline: **March 1**st (additional applications will be accepted through **April 30**th if the maximum amount has not been granted by that date)

The guidelines for this scholarship are as follows:

- An active member of FUSIT or registered participant in FUSIT RE program.
- Each family can apply for support for up to 2 people's (youth and/or adult) early registration fees.
- Applications for other support will be seen as indication of level of commitment of individual and will not be assumed to replace a FUSIT grant (in other words, if they receive a work assignment that covers registration, they may still use the FUSIT money to defer travel/housing costs).
- No family will receive a grant 2 years in a row, and preference will be given to those who have not received FUSIT funding in the past.
- A team of 3, including the minister and at least one Board member, will review applications and make the grants.
- All applicants who are granted funding must attend General Assembly as delegates on behalf of the First Unitarian Society of Ithaca. See the guidelines for delegates here: https://www.uua.org/ga/ congregations/delegates
