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

"Widening the Circle" UUA Book Discussion March 22

In 2017, UU leaders of color were asked to share their insights into how the Association could continue moving forward in the midst of another racially charged moment. The question is, how will our "living tradition" keep up with the times? What choices will we make—or fail to make—and how will that affect the relevancy and the survival of our faith? The report analyzes structural and systemic racism and white supremacy culture within Unitarian Universalism and makes recommendations to advance long-term change.

Through the Shared Plate Offering, the following donations were given to these charitable organizations:

On December 24 the offertory was shared between Babies First which received \$365.55 and Food Bank of the Souhtern Tier which also received \$365.55. Babies First is an all volunteer organization, in its 27th year at FUSIT, that provides tangible help to babies, young children, and their families in need within Tompkins County by offering free baby equipment. Food Bank of the Southern Tier's mission is to build and sustain hunger-free communitities throughout the Southern Tier, through their Community Advocates Program, an Education Series, distribution of farm fresh food, and monetary donations.

In January OAR (Opportunities, Alternatives and Resources) of Tompkins County received a total of \$469. Their mission for over 40 years has been protecting the civil liberties of those incarcerated in the Tompkins County jail through ensuring legal representation in the case of indigents, bailing eligible individuals pre-trial, a re-entry education program, and transitional sober housing.

SOME HISTORY on THE 8TH PRINCIPLE

Unitarian Universalism is no stranger to movements that call for racial justice both within and beyond our institutions. ۰. There have been many instances where pockets of people within 1.0 UU have worked to say racism is a problem and that we are committed to fighting racism and other oppressions. It was in 1997, the General Assembly first voted to commit to intentionally ٠. becoming an anti-racist, anti-oppressive, multicultural institution. • At the last two General Assemblies, the UUA published, ۰. Widening the Circle of Concern, a three-year study conducted and written by the Commission on Institutional Change that

1.0 "analyzed structural and systemic racism" throughout the Association and which proposed recommendations to address the shortcomings. In June 2021, the General Assembly overwhelmingly passed a Responsive Resolution to include ٠. antiracism and anti-oppression in the Principles.

٠. UUs across the country are being called to action and the UU Principles will guide us, but are they deep enough to result in social change regarding racial and social justice and equity? How is this 8th Principle different from the First - We covenant and affirm to promote the inherent worth and dignity of every person. Perhaps it hasn't gone deep enough to result in social change and ٠. therefore the need for the demonstrative language of the 8th • Principle? •

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On a local level at FUSIT, at the Annual Meeting in May, 2021, Jess and Miles Brown presented the wording for the 8th Principle:

To affirm and promote journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions.

• At that time, plans were discussed as to how to educate the . FUSIT congregation on the 8th Principle and its meaning. In May of 2021, there were 61 UU congregations that had adopted the 8th ٠. Principle; today there are 153. 14

The Anti-Racism Ministry Team (ARMT) has taken on the ۰. responsibility to continue the conversation. To date, the ARMT . has been conducting Living the Pledge workshops in which ۰. approximately 85 people have participated.

A workshop held on Sunday, February 13th, introduced the 1.0 8th Principle and multicultural change as a developmental process for congregations. Paula Cole Jones, co-author of the 8th Principle, provided information as to how other UU congregations have approached the spiritual and structural aspects of moving more fully into our vision of the Beloved ٠. Community. ٠.

1.0 The 8th Principle subcommittee plans to offer opportunities for the congregation to engage in discussions, ask questions and imagine the possibilities. There is such a session ٠. planned for Thursday, March 31, at 7:00 pm on Zoom. Further information on connecting will be provided in the mid-week announcements.

2022 FUSIT SILENT AUCTION FUNDRAISER COMING SOON!

Due to changes in congregational interests, minimal volunteer capabilities, and pandemic restrictions, fundraising teams were created last year to test out online auctions, using the Bidding Owl platform. It is therefore recommended that we hold one large fundraising auction in the Spring, setting a goal of \$12,000. From your Board of Trustees

Your board has spent a good deal of time in recent weeks in discussions about how best to move forward in the process of looking for a future minister. There are many dimensions to this question: what do we want or expect of a minster: spiritual leadership, pastoral care, Sunday sermons, staff supervision, outreach to the community? Is it reasonable to expect a minister to handle all of these and, if not, how should we prioritize this list?

What can we learn from our history – the book by Carol Kammen documents the last eighty years of that history and makes it clear that we have had only two long term ministers over that period and that periods with a short term minister or no minister at all were common. The average length of a minister's tenure nationwide is only five to seven years.

We also need to factor in current realities – there are more than twenty UU congregations in the US currently without a minister, there have been a lot of retirements during the pandemic and there is a relatively small pool of applicants our there looking for positions. What type of minister are we looking for – interim, developmental or contract, full or part time. Are there other alternatives at least in the short run? There are also financial considerations that we need to factor in. The board recently met with Keith Kron from the UUA to get some ideas on how best to weigh some of these issues.

As you can appreciate this is a complicated process and the board is looking for as much input as possible to navigate the minister decision process.

Before you know what kindness really is you must lose things, feel the future dissolve in a moment like salt in a weakened broth. What you held in your hand, what you counted and carefully saved, all this must go so you know how desolate the landscape can be between the regions of kindness. How you ride and ride thinking the bus will never stop, the passengers eating maize and chicken will stare out the window forever. Before you learn the tender gravity of kindness you must travel where the Indian in a white poncho lies dead by the side of the road. You must see how this could be you, how he too was someone who journeyed through the night with plans and the simple breath that kept him alive. Before you know kindness as the deepest thing inside, you must know sorrow as the other deepest thing. You must wake up with sorrow. You must speak to it till your voice catches the thread of all sorrows and you see the size of the cloth. Then it is only kindness that makes sense anymore, only kindness that ties your shoes and sends you out into the day to gaze at bread, only kindness that raises its head from the crowd of the world to say It is I you have been looking for, and then goes with you everywhere like a shadow or a friend.

Way Forward Team Guidance for Continued Re-opening Phase 3 - February 17, 2022

We are excited to continue to welcome members of our congregation back into our sanctuary for our Sunday morning worship services with the following guidelines:

• A maximum of 30 individuals or groups of people (family groups, pods etc.) or combination thereof, up to five total within each group, who are comfortable being within six feet of one another, not including those people who are a part of the service, will be welcomed into our sanctuary each Sunday morning.

• Pre-registration for Sunday services will not be required but all people attending must sign in and out at one of the entrances when entering and leaving the building.

• Everyone attending services will be required to have their temperature checked at the door. A temperature of 100.4 or higher will mean that individual will not be allowed to attend services or any activities inside the building that day.

• Physical distancing between groups will be required in the sanctuary during all services, with designated spaces clearly marked.

• Everyone must be masked at all times while in the building, save for anyone who is actively speaking at the podium. As per CDC guidance, it is strongly recommended that you wear the most protective mask you can that fits well and that you will wear consistently, such as an N95, N94, or similar style. Masks will be available as needed.

• Every person who will be leading Sunday worship service, i.e the RE leader, Celebrations Associate, all musicians, guest speakers etc., will need to provide a negative COVID rapid test the morning of the service.

• A social hour will follow each service but no food or drink will be served and we ask that people not bring their own to limit the amount of time people are not in masks.

• We request that anyone who has tested positive for COVID 19 within 48 hours of attending any in-person programming at FUSIT please contact the office so that other individuals who were present can be informed.

We are opening up our building use outside of Sunday worship to all FUSIT groups including, but not limited to, the following:

- FUSIT Board
- Staff
- Small Group Ministry
- Team and Committee Meetings
- Other small FUSIT groups such as Women's Group, Men's Group, Book Club etc.
- Individuals or small groups who wish to utilize our physical resources, such as the library or organ
- Listening Circles
- Other official FUSIT gatherings
- Memorial Services, Wedding, and other celebrations

Approved spaces include: the Sanctuary, the Annex, the Parlor, the Arch Room (Mark Pedersen Room), the Library, and the Conference Room (122 Ellen Watkins Harper Room).

- Library, Youth Room, and Conference: Maximum of 12 people
- Parlor, and Annex: Maximum of 40 people
- Arch Room: Maximum of **25 people**
- Sanctuary: Maximum of 100 people
- Everyone must use the sign in/out sheet placed at one of the five entrances to the building: Annex, Parlor, Front, Garden and Parish House. This must be done each and every time, even if it is a brief visit.

In addition we will be expanding rentals of our spaces beginning on December 1st, 2021 under the following guidelines:

- Rentals to outside groups may resume following FUSIT safety guidelines.
- All renters must continue to practice COVID safety precautions including masking, social distancing, and contact tracing, as well as any other requirements stipulated by their specific rental agreement.
 - All groups must adhere to the number of participants per each space listed above.
 - No food or drink may be served at any events inside the FUSIT building.

All individuals, even those who are fully vaccinated, must wear a mask and practice social distancing guidelines while inside the building.

If the answer to any of the below three questions is yes, or if you have a temperature of 100.4 degree or higher upon arrival, we ask that you please refrain from using the building for any reason.

1. Have you had any COVID-19 symptoms in the past 14 days, including fever/chills, cough, shortness of breath, muscle or body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell? EXCEPTION: If you had a negative COVID test while experiencing these symptoms or after these symptoms subside, you may use the building, following FUSIT's masking guidelines as usual.

2. Have you had a positive COVID-19 diagnostic test in the past 14 days?

3. Have you had close contact with a confirmed or suspected COVID-19 case in the past 14 days? EXCEPTION: Fully vaccinated people may get tested 3 - 5 days after exposure and quarantine until they receive a negative test result, then may use the building following FUSIT's masking guidelines.

Please follow current CDC guidelines for domestic and international travel.

All room requests must be made at least one week in advance. All use must be reserved through the office, not Breeze. Please email Michelle at office@uuithaca.org.

Food may be brought into and consumed in the building with the following guidelines:

- Only consume food you personally brought for yourself and place your mask back on as soon as you have finished eating
- Plan on removing all garbage/leftovers, please do not leave anything in the building
- No shared food or potlucks at this time
- Food may not be brought in for Sunday services
- Food or drink may not be served at any event whether it is a FUSIT event or a rental event
- All surfaces must be wiped down before and after eating

All groups must clean up after themselves.

There must be a minimum of one hour between the end of one gathering and the beginning of the next in each space. All other groups may meet indoors at any location of their choosing, complying with all of the guidelines by NYS for unvaccinated people.

Outdoor gatherings

For outdoor gatherings social distancing is highly recommended, in the case that social distancing cannot be maintained, masks are recommended, even for vaccinated individuals.

Closing Policy

FUSIT will be carefully following the guidance of local and state health officials, as well as monitoring other local agencies, such as schools, when deciding when and if to return to virtual-only gatherings.

In addition, should there be evidence that spread of the COVID19 virus has happened in our spaces, at an official FUSIT event, we will temporarily move to virtual until we are assured that all transmission has been detected and contained.
