

Joyful News From Ithaca Sanctuary Alliance!

Drucila and her 4 year old daughter Jessie, who have been living in the First Congregational Church sanctuary apartment since July of 2020, are now safe from deportation! Our congregation helped make that happen through our membership and support of The Ithaca Sanctuary Alliance (ISA)!

ISA is asking for our continued support as we help get Drucila and Jessie established in Ithaca. Drucila has applied for a green card and a work permit. While the green card will take longer to arrive, her work permit could be in hand within the next 2-3 months. When her work permit comes through, she will need to secure a job, housing for her and Jessie, and childcare. A transition team is working with her on life skills so that she can move out of the sanctuary apartment as soon as she is financially stable.

HERE'S WHAT IS NEEDED FROM THE FUSIT COMMUNITY:

- 1) Be on the lookout for job opportunities. Drucila has some good job leads, but suggestions are always welcome, especially for daytime positions with benefits.
- 2) Keep us informed of any affordable housing situations you might be aware of for our guests. Housing options could include a small apartment (rent in the \$700-\$800/month range), shared space in someone's home, or sharing an apartment with someone trustworthy who understands the needs of an energetic 4-year old. It is important that housing be accessible to a TCAT bus line.
- 3) Suggestions for reliable, childcare providers are also appreciated.

Over 150 congregations across the country have adopted a proposed 8th Principle which reads:

"We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

The 8th Principle group of the Antiracism Ministry Team is working to educate the congregation about the proposed 8th Principle through written communications, the February 13 workshop, and upcoming discussion groups. 

2022-23 STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN UPDATE - PLEDGING OPENS POSSIBILITIES By Matt Hare, representing the Stewardship Team

Part of this year's theme is "Cherishing our Past." When I look back at the history of giving at First Unitarian Society of Ithaca, I'm impressed that in

The other part of this year's theme is "Building Tomorrow Together." The 75 early bird households who sent in their pledges by newsletter press time have given us great momentum - THANK YOU! Not only that, but 59% of these early birds increased their pledges this year. This statistic shows a positive, can-do attitude about what is possible in this congregation. These pledges reflect the generous giving that is necessary to align our resources with our mission aspirations.

At press time the total dollars pledged was \$125,521—a great start—and slightly more than a third of the way if we use last year's goal of \$330,000 as a benchmark. But we really need to do better than last year. We want to come out of this pandemic strong, and we want to show unanimous solidarity with our mission by having everybody pledge something.

When we search for a minister this year (details of the search to be determined by the new Ministry Fulfillment Search Committee), one of the very meaningful statistics that candidates want to see is the proportion of member households pledging. What do you suppose that proportion is here at FUSIT? We have a lot of active non-member friends who give generously, but out of 287 signed-the-book members, what proportion do you think pledges?

At a recent meeting of Stewardship chairs from many UU congregations, I was hearing that 100 percent participation is not unusual. For us, in the recent past it has been between 60 and 70 percent. I know we can do better than that. We have to do better than that to fulfill our mission and be successful with a minister search.

So here's our message: try to be as generous as you can—but most importantly, everybody pledge something to show your support for our beloved community. Pledging is easy. It is just a promise, not a payment (unless you want to ③). You can use the pledge card that came in the mail, make your 2022-2023 pledge today at the FUSIT website, <u>Click here</u> or call or email Michelle in the office at 607-273-7521 or office@uuithaca.org.

I'll end with two small numbers that have BIG meaning. So far we have four new pledgers—WELCOME!—and three returning pledgers who did not pledge last year—WELCOME HOME! Last year was tough in a lot of ways. This pledge campaign is the opportunity we have to show that we are resilient, that we are resourceful, and that we are ready to Build Tomorrow Together!!

Stay tuned for that! Now it is time for the final Open Question for this church year. The Spring Open Question is "In living out our Second Principle, promoting justice, equity, and compassion in human relations, how can we do the vital work of dismantling systems of oppression while promoting and supporting kindness, trust, and gratitude within our community?"
