Ministry Fulfillment Committee, (previously Minister Search Committee)

At the March Board of Trustees meeting the Board passed a resolution to establish the Ministry Fulfillment Committee. Over the last couple of weeks six FUSIT members, Betsy East, Scott Grover, Magdalen Lindeberg, Margaret Nichols, Sue Rakow, and Andy Turner have been recruited for this Committee. Huge thanks to these folks for taking on this critical job!

The heart of their charge is to investigate fulfilling "Ministry responsibilities through any available UUA processes, cooperative arrangements with other organizations (either local or regional), combinations of paid and volunteer positions or other non-traditional approaches".

Two things we know going into this: 1.) FUSIT cannot afford a full time minister for the 22-23 year.
2.) We will have to be creative about how to provide the ministry functions – probably only some of them will be done by a minister. That is why we are using the term "ministry".

Over the next few months the committee will look at all the options to fulfill the ministry responsibilities. They will look for a person or persons, interview them and bring their recommendations to the Board. They will also recommend how to provide ministry functions this next year even if they do not find a minister.

The Ministry Fulfillment Committee will keep you posted about their work. Please support this Committee and the Board as we figure out next year at FUSIT. Please direct questions to the Board so the Committee can get to work.



Your Board is Listening

Summary of the Winter 2021-2022 Open Question Responses

This winter, the FUSIT congregation was asked a second Open Question by the Board of Trustees, A question that is vital to our liberal religious organization and necessary to inform our path going forward, as we work to grow and strengthen our community after a couple of very challenging years. The winter open question was: "Given our history and our hopes for the future, for what purpose does our religious community exist in 2022 and beyond? In other words, what is and should be our true Mission?"

Of the 92 responses, the most popular themes that emerged was the importance of providing opportunities for spiritual growth, learning, and healing for individuals (21) and fostering a sense of community within FUSIT (21). Transforming the world and bringing positive change to the larger community and world was the next theme prioritized by many responses (18). Similar themes of shifting to focus from oneself to the greater world and the need for the community to focus specifically on social justice projects (16) had strong support. It is clear that many people look to the church to connect with others who share their need for spiritual growth and wholeness, and that through that work, many share a collective hope to transform the world around us.

The mission of the church can include, but can also go beyond, our familiar mission statement "to create connection, find inspiration and engage the world." The Board, staff, and congregation are working together to define the mission of our organization. The answers to the winter Open Question can help guide that work. The Board is meant to serve the mission of the church and clarifying that mission is a point of upmost importance to inform the Board and Ministry decisions going forward.

Partnership Governance Committee

part-time minister or a lay-led congregation.

FUSIT's lay leadership activities are organized within committees that advise the Board of Trustees and ministry teams and staff that work with staff on the ministry of our church. This arrangement is part of our partnership governance structure. The Board of Trustees Policy Book created the Partnership Governance Committee (GovCo) to advise the Board on governance issues. Recently the Board asked GovCo to review FUSIT's by-laws and policy manual and recommend changes to keep this partnership structure functioning during times of transition. GovCo recommended and the Board accepted GovCo's recommendation to form two teams to partner with the Board in conducting the operations and ministry of our church to ensure that FUSIT continues its dynamic work and is able to easily move through the transitions into the future—whether that involves a new minister, a

The new teams are the **Ministry Visioning Team** (MVT) and the Operations Administration Team (OAT). The MVT will guide and coordinate the work of the various ministry teams to implement the annual Vision of Ministry and propose budget expenditures for ministry work. The OAT will guide and coordinate the work of the paid staff, including budget support, staff evaluation, and hiring of new staff as needed. Both teams will consist of 4 members with 2year terms. If you are interested in being part of one of these teams, let the Board know at board@uuIthaca.org.

In addition to helping these teams gain their footing, GovCo will review and recommend changes to the Policy Book to reflect the new partners (MVT and OAT) and their role, to assure the transition to the future occurs without disruption to FUSIT's many services and activities and preserves our organizational structure. Laura Free is GovCo's chair and deserves thanks for much hard preparatory work and sometimes tedious labor in crafting the language of GovCo's recommendations.

Message from the Board

The weather is turning nicer, so most Ithacans are thinking 'Spring'! But, as Treasurer of our congregation, I am thinking 'Budget Season'! So, in concert with our able Finance Committee, Finance Chair Nathan Fawcett and I have been piecing together a preliminary budget for the Board's consideration at our next regular monthly meeting. Once the Board has had its input, we will be sharing it with the congregation and, once in final form, we will be presenting it for approval at this year's annual meeting. Expect additional detailed information for your consideration in the coming weeks.

For now, I can share a little of the process. Many members of the congregation offered input on the budget. Though not every request could be met, we did what we could with limited resources. But I hope that the budget fairly rewards our wonderful staff, as well as reinstating funding for programming that we all want as our Society looks to the future.

However, as my able predecessor, Jennifer Streid-Mullen, was careful to point out, First Unitarian of Ithaca is facing a challenging financial situation. Yes, we have been able to balance our operating books, but only through a combination of one-time sources of revenue which will not come again. Looking forward to the 2022-23 fiscal year, we will not likely be able to afford a full-time, UUA sponsored minister. Instead, the Board has looked deeply at what ministerial functions are most important to meet and finding alternative ways of meeting these needs. Funding for these ministerial functions is in the budget, but exactly what this looks like is still unclear. Await further news.

UU Reads for Social Justice

8th Principle "Pro" Committee

FUSIT will have a vote at our Annual Meeting on **May 25** to adopt the proposed 8th Principle, which reads:

"We covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

This proposal is coming from the ground up and being adopted in congregations like ours, over 155 to date. The UUA has a surprisingly "not good" history, of not embracing the requests of UUs who identify as people of color, from the 1960s since, despite the good intentions of the majority of UUs. The adoption now commits us as individuals and the congregation to get into action against racism internally and in the bigger world NOW, rather than waiting until the UUA may officially adopt the 8th Principle, which will be June 2024 at the earliest. Yes, the UUA processes are long and cumbersome.

There are multiple reasons to support FUSIT's adoption of the 8th Principle at this time, and multiple reasons some congregants are opposed. We hope to provide a forum for this pro/con discussion on a webpage, where you can both read other FUSIT folks' opinions and express your own. This is currently under construction. Many/most of us have found the discussions we have been having informative and nuancing our views, perhaps without changing how we will vote in May. The discussion itself is of great value. Having said that, many of us also want to stop talking and get more into action.

We have 52% of the chalice flame we need to light our way in the 2022-2023 church year!


Every Pledge Counts

History of FUSIT now available!

The book A Liberal Church is the illustrated history of the First Unitarian Society of Ithaca from 1865 to 1945. It was written by Carol Kammen, the Tompkins County Historian, and aided greatly by FUSIT member Beverly Henderson West. Read about being a liberal congregation in the midst of orthodoxy, and wonder how and why FUSIT was planted in Ithaca and how it grew.

This book began on the occasion of our 150th anniversary, when Mark Pedersen asked our Ithaca historian Carol Kammen if she could write a book on the history of our church. A meeting was called for those interested in the project, committees were formed, and we proceeded on several fronts. After many delays, not the least of which was caused by the pandemic, the book was finally printed last summer.

The book is now available for a \$15 donation in the parlor after services or in the church office anytime the office is open.

Major Change to Sanctuary Seating
