

October Board of Trustees Meeting



From the Ministry Visioning Committee (MVT)

Dear fellow FUSIT members:

The Ministry Visioning Committee (MVT) of Nancy Miller, Don Rakow, Emily Richards, Peaches Gillette and joAnn Kowalski has been meeting monthly since this summer. As Board chair Don Barber recently shared with the congregation, the MVT is tasked with guiding and coordinating the work of the ministry by overseeing programming, ministry teams, and affinity groups to bring to life the annually developed Vision of Ministry.

Recently, the MVT has contributed to the orientation of Rev. Gillette, and has focused on how best to support the various teams that comprise the Team Leadership Council. Each MVT member will serve as the liaison to specific team leaders to determine their needs for support and help. The role of MVT is to support these teams, not to lead them.

Going forward, members of MVT are anxious to hear thoughts and ideas from any congregants on ways to better fulfill our mission to create connections, find inspiration, and engage the world.

What is the Ministry Visioning Team (MVT)?

This newly formed team consists of four people, whose task will be to guide and coordinate the work of the ministry and serve as governance partners with the Board to implement the goals articulated in the annual Vision of Ministry. This team will also regularly report back to the Board the progress in its implementation of the Vision of Ministry. It will guide the Team Leader Council and ensure coordinated efforts across all of FUSIT's ministry teams.

Charge of the MVT:

- Authority to guide and to make independent decisions regarding the implementation of the Vision of Ministry in coordination with the work of staff and Teams.
- Report the results of the Ministry work to the Board by having one MVT member present at each Board business meeting and submitting a ministry report to the Board each month.
- Create intentional communication with the Organization and Administration Team.
- To propose annual budget expenditures to support the ministry work.
- Partner with the Board in Vision of Ministry and Open Question development.
