Spring is a time of vulnerability. A time when the flowers and other plants begin to poke up through the dirt, seeking the sun and life. A time when a late cold snap or unexpected snow can easily kill delicate sprouts and blossoms.

Growth can feel like this sometimes, like we are reaching out in the hopes that we will flourish and bloom, not knowing if we will be met by gentle rain and warm sunshine, or if we will be met by frost, ice, or even floods. It can make us feel vulnerable, to brave the unknown in the hopes of something new.

Faith communities and people from cultures all around the world celebrate this time of year, the spring, as a time of renewal. A time of restoration. A time of new beginnings. But in that time of growth there is a kind of exposure, of defenselessness, that we also acknowledge as we gently nurture and care for this new life. We handle the eggs carefully, for fear that they may crack. We tend the soil and water the sprouts so that they can grow tall and strong.

As we continue to come back together as a community, as we enter this time of renewal and restoration, there is a vulnerability here as well. A necessity that we be open and sensitive to one another's needs. A need to nurture and care for one another, to tend to our spirits as gently as we would the newborn bunny, or the crocus who has pushed its way up through the snow.

Being vulnerable with one another is how we create true, deep, and meaningful connections. As we offer one another our hands in friendship, our hearts in love, I remind us all to be gentle with these gifts that we receive. For only through tending to one another, as we would tend to any new growth, can we help this community grow.



Helen Ann Yunis has worn many hats throughout her career and recently has been reconnecting with her inner artist as an apprentice to Alice Muhlback. Last year she showed her work, which was influenced in part by the suicide of her former partner of several decades and father of their daughter, Maria. Message From the Board of Trustees

Who are we? A statement of FUSIT's purpose.

These last 2+ years at FUSIT have been a time of so much questioning, searching, and transition. Our FUSIT community was shocked by the loss of our new, but already beloved minister, the loss by Covid of the face-to-face time together that we crave, and then the realization that a new settled minister would not happen. And so we took matters into our own hands, to plot a new course. These last months, many FUSIT members have been engaged in the development of our Shared Governance model, including our new MVT (Ministry Visioning Team), and OAT (Organization Administration Team), also Governance, Transitions, and other committees and teams, including, of course, the Board. And, for all of us, the Open Questions let us share what each of us wants our FUSIT community to be. In this time, everything we are about at FUSIT has been investigated, reviewed, and often rewritten to reflect who we are today, how we will engage for ourselves, and for our community.

But, during this process, so many times, in so many discussions, one overarching question that would guide our efforts has lingered: Who are we?

Who are we at FUSIT? Are we (our) UU Eight Principles? Are we those statements in the FUSIT Bylaws, our Covenant, our Mission Statement? Are we the sum of the purpose statements of our teams and committees? Many of us saw a need for a clear, succinct statement to define ourselves and why our FUSIT community exists. We wanted a statement that we can look to when we need guidance; a statement that's the 20 second sound bite for the newcomer at the welcome table; a statement for the greater outside community to understand us.

For these reasons, this Statement of FUSIT's Purpose has been proposed, debated, and agreed upon by the Board of Trustees:

FUSIT's purpose is to create and maintain a welcoming spiritual home for diverse, free-thinking people to unite in community, to provide fellowship, to broaden perspectives and understanding, and to live into our UU Principles by serving the interconnected web of life in justice, compassion, and love.

We hope and believe that you agree.

Ministry Visioning Team Report

The MVT met again on February 10 to discuss several pertinent issues. The first of these was the future of the Social Justice Council (SJC). As background, Mary Clabby spoke about her past involvement with the work of the Charleston UU church and their collaboration with the local chapter of DART (thedartcenter.org). After discussion, we are proposing the creation of a Social Justice Steering Team, which would consist of three to four individuals and would:

-Help to create and maintain an organizational structure that supports all of our social justice teams and projects in moving forward with their work

-Work together to identify a couple of congregation-wide projects per year -Collect and distribute a list of local

organizations and ways to support them

-Assist with communicating opportunities for social justice work to the FUSIT community

This new model was discussed at a congregation-wide meeting on February 19th.

We next discussed the process that's begun to fill the Engagement and Outreach position. Until that person is in place, it is challenging to find volunteers to sit at the Welcoming Table before and after services.

Adult Religious Exploration

The Adult Religious Education (ARE) Team offers pre-service presentations held on the first and third Sundays of each month of the church year in the Annex, unless indicated otherwise in the Order of the Service, the Weekly Announce, and/or the monthly newsletter. Coffee and treats are served starting from 8:45 am, with the presentation (including discussion and Q&A) running from 9:00-10:15 am. March 5, 9:00 am in the Annex, coffee at 8:45

Grant Farred is a Professor at the Africana Studies and Research Center at Cornell. He has written on a range of subjects including race, politics, sports, and the formation of intellectuals. His most recent book is about Ukraine: The Zelensky Method (Westphalia Press 2022).

Professor Farred will review the current situation in Ukraine, and argue that the primary responsibility for liberating Ukraine from Putin must begin with the Russian people, such as those Russian soldiers who form the "Free Russia Legion", a group of Russian fighters supporting the Ukrainian forces. The Free Russia Legion is a combat group composed of Russians so opposed to President Vladimir Putin's invasion of Ukraine that they have been willing to take up arms against their own country. Their goal is to repel the Russian invasion of Ukraine and ultimately depose the Putin regime.

March 19, 9:00 am in the Annex, coffee at 8:45 Anthroposophy: "A Brief Introduction, with Thoughts on the Meaning of Life and Death."

Anthroposophy (wisdom of the human being) was developed by Rudolf Steiner, an Austrian philosopher and scientist who lived from 1861 to 1925. His philosophy teaches that "through inner development and training a person can gain knowledge of the spiritual world." Its lasting outgrowths include Biodynamic farming, Waldorf education (we have a Waldorf school here in Ithaca), and Curative Education centers like Camphill communities and schools, which offer support and acceptance to adults and children with various disabilities and special needs. Steiner's philosophy also inspires philanthropy (see "RSF Social Finance"), architecture and art, counseling, biography work, and various healing arts such as music, speech, and drama.

Our speaker, Inez Vermaas, was introduced to anthroposophy at age 14, and it has been central to her life ever since. She studied biodynamic farming both in the Netherlands and at Emerson College in England. After visiting a Camphill community in the north of England, she continued working in Camphill communities for the next 30 years, including 16 years in South Africa and 4 in Copake in the Hudson River valley. Moving to Ithaca in 2013, she and her current partner Tom started a bed & breakfast overlooking Treman State Park. She enjoys the "hundreds of guests who enrich our lives." Inez' talk will be followed by some time for lively discussion!

Each year, no more than up to \$2,000 will be granted to applicants showing financial need. Application Deadline: **April 1st**. Email or print to office@uuithaca.org. The guidelines for this scholarship are as follows:

- An active member of FUSIT or registered participant in FUSIT RE program.
- Each family can apply for support for up to 2 people's (youth and/ or adult) early registration fees.
- Applications for other support will be seen as indication of level of commitment of individual and will not be assumed to replace a FUSIT grant (in other words, if they receive a work assignment that covers registration, they may still use the FUSIT money to defer travel/housing costs).
- No family will receive a grant 2 years in a row, and preference will be given to those who have not received FUSIT funding in the past.
