Welcome to a new year of Religious Exploration (RE). This year we will be exploring The Gifts of Our Faith, starting with the Gifts of Welcome. 

This year's Southern Tier AIDS Program's (STAP) Ride for Life will be Saturday, **September 9, 2023,** www.aidsrideforlife.org. Since 2006, FUSIT has coordinated the first pit stop (our involvement actually started prior to that) and there have always been FUSIT member riders!

This year the first pit stop is at a **new location: Genoa Historical Association** which is located right on 34B before you get to the four corners in King Ferry. Our pit stop theme will focus on kindness once again.

So, what do the pit stop volunteers do? Well, we encourage and cheer on the riders and make sure that the food and beverages which are provided are accessible so that the riders will be well nourished and hydrated for their trek. We also make sure they enter and leave the stop safely and see the nurse if needed. Often, we have provided music. We have a reputation as the most welcoming stop.

The good news, if you're an early bird, is that the pit stop "opens" for the first riders between 7:15 and 7:30 am (which means being set up by then). Typically, we are cleaned up and driving back to Ithaca by 10:30 am so it's a quick day!

In a letter (I highly recommend that you read it) accompanying the advisory, Dr. Murthy calls on us to strengthen our own connections and to help others and our communities to do so also.
