What Happened to the Trees?

The trees in front of the church on Aurora Street were cut down in preparation for a major reconstruction of the sidewalk by the city, probably in June. They made this decision after our volunteers and the city sidewalk maintenance teams struggled for many years with the aggressive shallow roots which heaved up the sidewalk every year, creating tripping and slipping hazards. We tried to manage these problems by grinding down the edges and replacing bricks, but the surfaces kept getting more uneven, and the roots have been growing into our foundation as well. They were a popular urban tree species, but an unfortunate choice for this location. The city will replace them in the fall with a smaller species, possibly something flowering.



Nick and Gayle raised their three sons in Poughkeepsie and were members of the Poughkeepsie Unitarian Universalist Fellowship for 42 years. We look forward to hearing about their work fighting against immoral wars, poverty, injustice, and climate change. And it will be interesting to hear about their long-time membership in the Poughkeepsie UU congregation. The program will include an opportunity for questions and discussion.

Blue Zones - Movie Showing and Discussion Sunday, April 7, 9:00-10:00 am in the Annex

Would you like to live a long, vibrant life? There are places around the world where a large population has lived active, vital lives past 100 years. These are called Blue Zones. Author Dan Buettner travelled around the world and discovered five unique communities where people live extraordinarily long and energetic lives. He documented what he has learned in a series called "Live to 100: Secrets of the Blue Zones."

This is the last screening in a 4-part series. We invite you to join us to learn what these individuals, but more importantly their communities are doing to support their elders to remain vibrant centenarians. In the United States, students in middle school, high school, college and universities take a day-long vow of silence to symbolically represent the silencing of LGBTQ+ students. Hundreds of thousands of students at more than 8,000 schools observe this event, which is traditionally held on the second Friday of April.



Message From Stewardship

Gifting Grows Connections. That's our Stewardship theme this year, but of course it applies every year. Boy, did we feel the connections grow when pledge season was launched February 25 (still viewable on YouTube)! We heard about the great need that this congregation is filling by supporting Babies First. We heard about the Social Justice team and their multipronged efforts within FUSIT and in our Tompkins County community. We heard about the planned installation of a heat pump in the Annex, and the grant writing that made it possible for us to live closer to our earth-friendly values. And we heard about the positive impact our RE program, and the RE director, Emily, is having on our youth, our families, and our welcoming practice. Much of our work has revolved around two areas recently – the budget and staffing for the upcoming year. Two MVT members sit on the Budget Team: Emily Richards and joAnn Kowalski and we are working to fine tune the 2024-25 budget to ensure a successful and robust year for FUSIT.

In terms of staffing, MVT is working to accommodate the growing and changing needs of the congregation, which includes determining how best to manage the responsibilities of the Engagement and Outreach Coordinator as this position has been unfilled since the end of January. We are grateful for those folks who have signed up to be at the Welcome Table on Sundays! This is an important part of our weekly services

and key to welcoming and meeting new visitors.

MVT is pleased with the success of the Care Cafes which Rev. Peaches Gillette has been facilitating along with Christine Kapral. These are offered monthly on the second and fourth Sundays.

Our team has begun the work of developing the Vision of Ministry for '24-'25 by reviewing the many responses that have been submitted. There are several themes that are recurring, and we hope to incorporate those into developing the VOM for the upcoming year. Next step is to submit a draft to the Board.

MVT has spent the first part of the church year responding to many emergent issues and incorporating supervision of the senior ministry staff into what we do. This has resulted in a busy time with many activities to attend to while ensuring adequate communication with the Board.
