

Update from the Strategic Planning Committee of the Board of Trustees

"To be vibrant and attractive, a congregation needs a shared sense of direction. A strategic plan answers the question, "In what new and different ways will we touch lives in the coming 3 to 5 years?" D. Hotchkiss, Congregational Consulting Group Consultant

From The Coastal Business Journal, Vol.2, Does Strategic Planning Help Churches?: An Exploratory Study (Shah, David & Surawsk, 12/03): "The findings indicate that churches using strategic planning experience greater growth in both attendance and finances."

These articles emphasize the importance of strategic planning to the success of a religious nonprofit organization, yet, throughout FUSIT's relatively long history we find no evidence of a prior strategic plan on record. The Strategic Planning Committee is excited to announce that this year FUSIT will introduce our first 3-5 year, forward-looking strategic plan for Ministry of this congregation. (Concurrently, the Finance Committee has been developing a financial strategic plan.)

For the past year the Strategic Planning Committee (an ad hoc committee mandated by the Board of Trustees) has been busy meeting and collecting data. We've looked at local demographics and upcoming infrastructure changes in our Ithaca community, examined strategic plans from other churches, and collected data from our congregation. An attempt to avoid redundancy led us to the archives of the pre-pandemic work of the DreamCatchers, along with a close look at results from Reverend Lydia's survey to the congregation; SWOT board add-ons by the congregation; and a look back at responses to open questions to the congregation posed by the Board of Trustees. Finally, from three carefully chosen open questions circulated to the congregation through the last third of the 2024 church year, we received 44 responses. These responses, along with the aggregate of other data collected, will direct our ministry in ways which reflect this congregation's values and desires for the next three to five years.

The Strategic Planning Committee has begun analysis of this data and the strongest trends have been identified. Most of these are no surprise: this congregation values community, service to others, intellectually stimulating sermons, and solid religious education. Our job now is to dive deeper into each of these broad trends to find further definition, and to examine more closely the many other threads among individual comments received. While working on this analysis, the committee is also busy writing a first draft of the strategic plan.

Please feel free to reach out to any member of the Strategic Planning Committee with your questions. We will be wearing purple name tags on Sundays, and we look forward to conversation.

FUSITAnnual Action Priorities

After feedback from leadership this year we are shifting our Vision of Ministry to Annual Action Priorities in an effort to bring clarity and focus to our shared ministry work. The three priorities that we will be directing our energy towards are:

#1: Live our 25-26 fiscal reality

Description: To create an amended revenue and spending plan for 25-26 by December 1, 2025 and implement through June 30, 2026

#2: Increase relevance and visibility of UU values and principles within our programming

Description: To focus our ministry work on the current needs of our community in light of current events and in a way that clearly demonstrates our UU values

#3: Strengthen congregational ownership

Description: To develop and implement approaches and programming that increase the congregations engagement in FUSIT activities and leadership

FUSIT Finance #4 Status of Savings Funds to Close Budget Gaps

We ended 19-20 fiscal year with savings of \$139,000. Since that time, the church leadership has decided to invest that savings in maintaining programs while we rebound from the pandemic. The peak of this deficit spending occurred 23-24. We started the year with \$54,000 in savings but ended the year using \$39,000 in savings to cover insufficient revenue.

So, we began 24-25 fiscal year with \$15,000 in savings. We ended that fiscal year using all those savings to fill in the \$32,000 space between spending needs and lacking revenue. The June 30, 2025, balance sheet shows we also used \$16,000 of prepaid 25-26 pledges to pay 24-25 expenses. So, we begin 25-26 with no savings back-up and \$16,000 less available funds for 25-26.

Much of this shortfall comes from pledge revenues, as of year-end, \$28,000 less than budget. And total expenditure was \$9000 over budget.

We have our work cut out for us to change this pattern.
