I'm looking for a religion that first and foremost welcomes me as I am, a busy, flawed, often bewildered person who is doing her best in a complicated world. ~Rev. Jane Rzepka

I'd imagine each of you, like Rev. Rzepka describes above, is doing your best and you are welcome here. Each of you is welcome to bring your whole selves – the good parts and the not-so-good parts. And, in this community, we practice being human in a complicated world.

Part of that practicing to be human means learning how to be in community with one another. There will be times we will fail one another, and this community. There will be times when we, as individuals, will lose sight of the goals and hopes of the congregation, and need to be reminded of our bond to one another. In this process, it is important that we speak openly, and be gracious, with one another.

On **April 15th** we will have an installation service at First Unitarian. Some folks think this event is about me and my ministry. But it is so much more than that. The installation service is about all of us and our shared ministry. The installation is a formal covenanting between me, as your minister, and you, as the congregation that called me, and our goals and hopes for our ministry together.

We will covenant together with knowledge that, first and foremost, we are part of a faith tradition that welcomes each of us just as we are. We will do so with knowledge that we will, at times, disappoint one another. We will do so with the promise to keep showing up in our shared ministry, even when hard things happen.

The installation is an event for this congregation, this community, and our greater UU movement. I hope you'll be there! Together, let's celebrate our emerging shared ministry!



Feel our Momentum, Fuel our Mission

Were you there when we danced our pledges and offerings down the aisle on that memorable Sunday in March? Thank you to all who made Pledge Sunday such a success—the choir, the drummers, the musicians, the dancers, Nancy Spero and the Rosebud Ramblers, the refreshment crew, the clean-up crew, and Reverend Weis, who challenged us to give joyously. What fun! Our Pledge Campaign's momentum is truly fueling our mission.

On pledge Sunday 45 of us made pledges totaling more than \$80,000. Added to our early pledges, by mid-March we had 81 pledges totaling \$189,418. That is the momentum we need to reach our goal of 225 pledges and \$325,000. Thank you to all who were able to increase your pledge this year. On average, people have increased their annual pledge by almost 10%.

Why are pledges of support so important and why do we need them now? Annual pledges help us plan for the year ahead. The board will create next year's budget based on our expected revenue. The majority of our society's income comes from our annual gifts. The budget will be prepared in April and presented to the congregation at the annual meeting in May. How much we can plan to do next year depends on the success of our pledge drive this spring.
