Multigenerational Services

We've planned for one Multigenerational Service per month this year. These services help your children develop a stronger sense of their identity as Unitarian Universalists by participating in the ritual practices of our church. Knowing how to participate is something that takes time to learn. That learning process can be challenging for our children, pushing them and us outside of our comfort zones. All of our children are at different stages of development, and capable of different levels of engaging with services. Families in our church, particularly those with the youngest children, have told me multigenerational services are working out great, and for some it has been difficult, and many are somewhere in between.

Many of us, particularly those with young children, find it challenging keeping children quiet and still for the whole service. Some of us come from childhood experiences where those were the expectations for children in church, and are mortified if our children are not behaving this way. I want to reassure you that that is not the expectation or the goal at FUSIT.

There have been a few occasions when my kids have not been still or quiet. Positive comments from others about how much joy they get from seeing my kids in service have helped me let go of the expectation that my children be perfect – now every time my kids are acting up in service I try to tell myself that they are helping reassure all of you that it is okay if your kids aren't perfect! And I want to tell you how often in the last few months people have told me how much having the children's energy and joy in the services has renewed their spirit. The church culture we are trying to create is one that is warm, energetic, and family friendly. Thank you all for contributing to that!


