

Babies First Appeal

Babies First is an all volunteer organization, in its 27th year at FUSIT, that provides tangible help to babies, young children, and their families in need within Tompkins County by offering free baby equipment. Referrals are received directly from individuals or from 18 plus non-profit public agencies throughout the county. Babies First accepts "like new" baby equipment including *pack 'n plays, strollers, bigb chairs, baby carriers etc.* BF also provides new unused car seats for infants and toddlers.

Covid 19 shut down Babies First in March. We began serving the needs of the community again in June and since then have given away lots of equipment and 13 car seats. We have worked with Tompkins County Action, DSS, The Day Care Council, The Village at Ithaca, refugee programs and others as they opened up.

We missed our Spring fundraiser and the future of Babies First looks bleak unless we can raise some funds to buy car seats. We currently do not have enough car seats to meet the need. Donations of equipment or financial contributions are always welcome. Living the Pledge - Facilitator Training December 4th and 5th

We are bringing the Living the Pledge Workshop to Ithaca on **December 4 and 5**, with an initial training for 20 future facilitators, who will then help facilitate a couple of similar workshops for our congregation in 2021.

The primary goal of this workshop is to develop confidence in our abilities to:

- Integrate the Pledge to End Racism into our daily lives
- Recognize and challenge systemic racism
- Confront racism and bias in our everyday lives, and
- Take leadership in ending racism in our community, our culture, and our lives

The Richmond Pledge to End Racism, based on the Birmingham Pledge, is a personal commitment to work on ourselves and with others developed by the Richmond, Virginia, UUA congregation, to address racism in all its form. It reads:

The Pledge to End Racism

I BELIEVE that every person has worth as an individual.

I BELIEVE that every person is entitled to dignity and respect, regardless of race or color.

I BELIEVE that every thought and every act of racial prejudice is harmful; if it is my thought or act, then it is harmful to me as well as to others.

Therefore, from this day forward:

I WILL strive daily to eliminate racial prejudice from my thoughts and actions.

I WILL discourage racial prejudice by others at every opportunity.

I WILL treat all people with dignity and respect;

I WILL commit to working with others to transform this community into a place that treats people of all races, ethnicities, and cultures with justice, equity, and compassion, and

I WILL strive daily to honor this pledge, knowing that the world will be a better place because of my effort.

The Living the Pledge Workshop is a 12-hour virtual zoom workshop designed to give participants confidence in their ability to talk about and confront racism wherever it lives. The workshop is about 50% small group discussion, with the same small group throughout and beyond the workshop. Some pre-work is required, as is a commitment to attend all sessions.

We are bringing the Living the Pledge Workshop to Ithaca on **December 4 and 5**, with an initial training to train 20 future facilitators, who will then each help facilitate a couple of similar workshops for our congregation in 2021.

As part of the workshop, participants develop a community of support and an understanding of how to use support in deepening our work in building a just and equitable multicultural world.

The workshop is for everyone - for people who have:

-engaged in other anti-racism/multiculturalism training. This workshop is designed to take your understanding and your competency to a deeper level, connecting you with other community activists.

-never taken a class about racism. This workshop will challenge you to invest in and deepen your learning so you can put yourself on the road to intercultural competence.

The Anti-racism Ministry Team has Begun!

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Our major goal is to facilitate and support anti-racism education and action within our FUSIT community and then to move out into the greater Ithaca community. Our major hope is that we as a spiritual community will, over time, have a deep understanding of white supremacy, racism and how we can contribute to dismantling them in our society. This work is not just for those of us on this team but everyone at FUSIT. Another hope is that this work will become an important and persisting thread of our spiritual commitment to our first principle: The inherent worth and dignity of every person. The team has had vibrant discussions about our goals, about how we want to organize ourselves, and about where we want to start this important work.

We will begin our work by bringing **The Richmond Pledge to End Racism** and the **Living the Pledge** program to our congregation. Five of us, including Rev. Margaret, have just completed a virtual form of this program offered by the Richmond Virginia UU Church, where the Pledge was started. What an excellent challenging program! On **December 4-5**, a group of FUSIT leaders will take part in a Train the Trainers workshop. On Sunday, **December 6**, our Sunday service will be: *Moving Toward Justice – A Service on Living the Pledge*, **Rev. Margaret Weis and leaders from the Living the Pledge Program**. This service will be a kick-off for our congregation-wide effort focused on this program. By February, we hope to offer the first Living the Pledge program led by our own leaders. More definite dates and information will be available later in December. More information about the Living the Pledge program can be found on page 6 of this newsletter.
