
We did it! We did it! We made it through 2020, and we are embarking on a fresh new year with new possibilities!

Non-rechargeable batteries can be disposed of in your garbage; Tompkins County does not have a recycling program for them, but many other New York municipalities do.



Update from the FUSIT Board of Trustees

The FUSIT Board of Trustees will be providing a brief "Sense of the Board Meeting" report and sharing it through the newsletter and the weekly announcements the week after a Board of Trustees meeting. The full meeting minutes will continue to be made available but this brief meeting summary is intended to keep the congregation tuned in to the activities and priorities of the Board.

Here is the "Sense of the Meeting" from the December 9 meeting, held on Zoom from 6:30-8:06pm.

Rev. Margaret opened the meeting by lighting a chalice.

Recognition: The Board extends congratulations to Rev. Margaret, who has been elected to serve as the Vice President for the St. Lawrence District UU Ministers Association (UUMA) chapter!

Healthy Congregation: Rev. Margaret has been putting together a Healthy Congregations Team, and the current members include Betsy East, Walt Peck, Angela Zhang with two others considering the "ask."

Vision of Ministry: The Board will hold a Balcony meeting in early January, prior to the regular monthly business meeting, to work on the 2021-22 Vision of Ministry. Financial Matters: Jennifer Streid-Mullen, our Treasurer, has determined what portion of our PPP loan will need to be repaid. Thank you to Jennifer for her work!

Sanctuary and Organ Repairs: The Board approved funding for repairs and improvements to the Sanctuary, including additional insulation, new plaster, new paint, and updated LED bulbs in the three pendant lights.

FUSIT Service Auction: The ad hoc committee has chosen BiddingOwl as the software for the Auction. The committee will soon publish a list of specific volunteer opportunities. Help us grow into this new method of fundraising and community reinforcement, and remember: this year's auction theme is LOVE!

Countering Structural Racism: The Board has scheduled a January retreat for the Board, Minister and Staff, and the Ministry Anti-Racism team, with the assistance of the Rev. Sunshine Wolfe.

Anti-Racism Moment The Law and Slavery*

Essay: Mass Incarceration by Bryan Stevenson

After the Civil War, in the southern states, "the laws governing slavery were replaced with Black Codes – making the criminaljustice system central to new strategies of racial control." Each state had its own set of codes, and the crimes included: vagrancy, bearing arms, gathering as a group after dark, adultery between races, and seeking employment without a note from a former enslaver. "Anything that challenged the racial hierarchy could be seen as a crime, punished either by the law or by lynching that stretched from Mississippi to Minnesota."

Today, the injustice of the Black Codes has been replaced by racial profiling, police brutality, mandatory minimum sentencing rules, three-strikes laws, and the war on drugs. Our prisons are filled with the descendants of African slaves.

Sanctuary Repair Project, Winter 20-21

For a long time, we've been wanting to make our Sanctuary look better. To do so and to take advantage of being unable to use the Sanctuary during the pandemic, we have put together a construction project to fix the plaster cracks and repaint the Sanctuary. Several experts have concluded that the steeple is sound and the cracks are not growing. Buildings and Grounds has been working to develop the scope and details of the project which will also include completing the upgrade of Sanctuary lighting to LED's. In addition, some additional areas of the Sanctuary could use more insulation. These efforts will require a significant amount of scaffolding in the Sanctuary this winter. At the same time, we need to do some major maintenance work to preserve and protect the organ.

The whole project – organ maintenance, insulation, plaster repair, repainting, and LED lighting - will come to about \$150,000. Work should begin in January, with organ work completing after Easter.

Despite the financial hardships of these times for many people, a few generous members have contributed over \$85,000 to this project. The balance will be financed by a loan from our Endowment, at payments that will remain constant with current levels for the next 5-10 years. Babies First Appeal

Babies First is an all volunteer organization, in its 27th year at FUSIT, that provides tangible help to babies, young children, and their families in need within Tompkins County by offering free baby equipment.

Referrals are received directly from individuals or from 18 plus non- profit public agencies throughout the county. Babies First accepts "like new" baby equipment including pack 'n plays, strollers, high chairs, baby carriers etc. BF also provides new unused car seats for infants and toddlers. Covid 19 shut down Babies First in March. We began serving the needs of the community again in June and since then have given away lots of equipment and 13 car seats. We have worked with Tompkins County Action, DSS, The Day Care Council, The Village at Ithaca, refugee programs and others as they opened up.

We missed our Spring fundraiser and the future of Babies First looks bleak unless we can raise some funds to buy car seats. We currently do not have enough car seats to meet the need. Donations of equipment or financial contributions are always welcome. Please consider this and if you chose to help out with Babies First, make your check out to FUSIT Babies First.
