

From the Board of Trustees

During this time when the church year is barreling towards summer, all the activity associated with the annual meeting comes into focus. The leadership teams are crafting a new budget, and updating the society's vison of ministry; annual reports are being written, evaluations undertaken. Some members are finishing up their terms. A slate of new members has been nominated.

In the middle of all this, the board took a breath and paused to ponder what it feels like to be a board member at the First Unitarian Society of Ithaca. After all, it isn't an especially glamorous position. The board is the keeper of our policies. Congregants rarely effervesce about "policy," so, much of the time, the board is out of view.

Board members noted that the role is a time-consuming one. The younger members find it hard to carve time for board work in their busy lives and envy the retirees on the board. The retirees find the work tiring and envy the energy of the younger members. Currently, the board is well-organized, with needed tasks distributed throughout the year. Onboarding, both as training and getting to know one another, helps members adapt to working outside of their comfort zone. Over time, we feel like we grow into the unfamiliar and challenging roles that come with the territory.

Board members value this church highly. It is rewarding to spend time with and work with others who have this value, too. It is fulfilling to support an organization one cares about, to be effective in a function that many shy away from.

Collectively we have learned more about connecting with the Ministry Visioning Team, The Operations and Administrative Team, and the Budget Team, as the governance structure has progressed from an untested idea to a system in need of fine tuning. As the conversation progressed, we shifted away from enumerating the challenges to being grateful for the rewards.

Needless to say, we did not pause too long. There is plenty to do between now and the end of the year.

Ministry Visioning Team Year End Report

The Ministry Visioning Team (MVT) continues to meet twice a month with the final meeting occurring in June for four of the members: Rev. Janet Shortall, Nancy Miller, Don Rakow and joAnn kowalski. Emily Richards, Director of Congregational Life and Religious Exploration, will continue as staff representative on MVT. Efforts to recruit new members to MVT have resulted in Betsy East and Therese O'Connor joining the team.

Our work this Spring has had a major focus on planning for Congregational Life staffing for the '24-'25 year. We are pleased to report that the current spiritual leaders will continue in the new church year. Rev. Janet Shortall will be contracted for pastoral care as well as participating with the Care Team monthly. Emily Richards and Rev. Peaches Gillette will continue in the same roles they held this past year.

Meetings were held with the Board of Trustees and the Governance Committee to continue partnership and encourage communication with these entities. Our work consistently extends to encompass other teams, committees, and the Board, realizing the importance of collaboration and sharing of information in our shared governance structure.

The Staff Wellbeing Initiative is proceeding with supervisors conducting interviews with staff before the end of May. Once the responses are collected, they will be forwarded to Board member, Megan McCormick, for analysis. Our intent is to express gratitude and cultivate connection with staff by listening to their concerns and desires. Annual staff evaluations for ministry staff will be conducted in early June.

FUSIT will be participating in the Ithaca Festival parade and have an information table during the weekend of the festival. Look for information to volunteer to participate in the activities.



June 16: Jim Garbarino, A Spiritual Approach to Understanding Trauma

Most educated people have some appreciation for the psychological challenges posed by trauma—most notably PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder). But beyond the psychological challenges are the existential challenges to core aspects of spiritualty, profound questions regarding the "meaning of life." This sermon delves into those spiritual/existential issues, drawing upon both research and first-hand experience with trauma in the lives of kids and adults, in the United States and all around the world.

June 23: Carol Whitlow: Home Sweet Home

In 2003, Ithaca welcomed a Karen man from a refugee camp on the Burma-Thai border. He was then able to bring his mother, brothers and sisters - an ever extending family who now call Ithaca home. Carol will share a conversation with Paw Pha about the adventure and challenges of making a new home far away from familiar language, culture, weather and politics.

June 30: Philip Terrie: A Conversation About Wilderness in the Adirondacks

Is There Wilderness in the Adirondacks? If so, how does it nourish the soul and body? Is it protected by Article 14 of the NYS Constitution? What are the historical and potential threats to wilderness in the Adirondacks?

July 7: Therese O'Connor, Es Muy Complicado

Glennon Doyle writes, "Blessed are those who make things awkward, for they wake us up and move us forward." We humans are very complicated and often mysterious. Can a complicated journey through fear, addiction, and art offer some nuggets of insight or sparks of compassion? This will be awkward, but I'll try to address it.

July 14: Howard Nelson (guest speaker), So Much Depends Upon William Carlos Williams

William Carlos Williams is best known for a short poem about a red wheelbarrow, but there is a lot more to him and his work than that. He's a writer who has been important to me since a high school English teacher showed me that poem – a life-changing event. This talk will combine some of William's poems and my reflections about him now, fifty years later. Handouts of poems will be provided.

July 21: Rod Howe, The Art of Seeing Altars Everywhere

How might one develop a practice of regularly honoring and remembering by seeing little (and sometimes big) altars everywhere? I'll share my thoughts on this process and how it is helping me embrace life with a sense of gratitude and equanimity.

July 28: Preston Wilson, Popular Music as Empathetic Prayer

When interpreted by inspired performers, many popular songs can unite us in affirming life's wonders and lamenting life's sorrows. Concert videos of k.d. lang, Joan Osborne, Yusuf (Cat Stevens), Willie Nelson, and Simon and Garfunkel invite us to share in these powerful and empathetic musical prayers.

August 4: Phoebe Brown (guest speaker), What Does It Mean To Be in Alliance with Families for Justice?

The talk will be about Alliance for Justice (AFJ) programs, the importance of AFJ located in Central New York, and why Friends of AFJ is so important.

August 11: Wren Tuatha, Painters, Poets, Sculptors and Singers

We've heard of the Harlem Renaissance, the salons of Paris, and even the New York School. These communities mixed artists of every material and genre, blending their audiences in the process. What art results when writers, painters, choreographers, photographers, etc., deeply influence each other? Ithaca Poetry Center Director Wren Tuatha will explore this, with a fun look at an emerging genre, hybrid writing.

August 18: Walt Peck, Heresy!

Many of us are heretics. But what if the tables are turned? Follow the ebb and flow of one person's faith journey as a Unitarian-Universalist

August 25: Fred Balfour, If "Community" is the answer, what is the question?

You have probably been asked some version of "Why do you go to a church that doesn't believe in God?" Many of us say, "It's for the community." When your friends roll their eyes, what do you say next? Here's the universal answer.
