# Our Spiritual Tourney

The question is not so much 'What do I learn from stories?' as 'What stories do I want to live?' David Loy

As we step into the new year, we find ourselves in a place of uncertainty - longing for reasons to hold onto hope while at the same time feeling an inescapable tension and anxiety. We are left wondering what the stories of this year will bring.

As I myself wonder what lies ahead I am reminded that the stories that stick with us, that stand the test of time, are those of perseverance in the face of great hardship.

It's the story told in the diary of a young Jewish girl who lived a life too brief, in a time of unimaginable suffering, but whose words continue to touch us decades later.

It's in the tales of so many people who were a part of the unyielding struggle for the right of Black Americans to live and thrive with equality and justice.

And it's found in the histories of our own faith, such as the Unitarians who played a pivotal role in organizing relief for European refugees during World War II—where the symbol of the flaming chalice was first born.

It's also in the story of the first female Universalist minister, who was arrested for defying societal expectations and boldly preaching as a woman during that era.

And in so many others—names that come easily to our lips because they made a difference in the world when it was needed most. We remember these people because they lived through profound oppression, yet chose to write their own story as one who resisted. One who stood firm against the injustices they faced, refusing to accept the systems that sought to suppress them.

What will our story be?





#### Beacon on Aurora - An Evening with Peter Mulvey, Sunday, January 12, doors open at 6:30 pm, concert begins at 7 pm

Peter Mulvey has been a songwriter, road-dog, raconteur and almost-poet since before he can remember. Raised working-class Catholic on the Northwest side of Milwaukee, he took a semester in Ireland, and immediately began cutting classes to busk on Grafton Street in Dublin and hitchhike through the country, finding whatever gigs he could. Back stateside, small shows led to larger shows, which eventually led to regional and then national and international touring.

Nineteen records, an illustrated book, thousands of live performances, a TEDx talk, a decades-long association with the National Youth Science Camp, opening for luminaries such as Ani DiFranco, Emmylou Harris, and Chuck Prophet, appearances on NPR, an annual autumn tour by bicycle, emceeing festivals, hosting his own boutique festival (the Lamplighter Sessions, in Boston and Wisconsin)... Mulvey never stops. He folds everything he encounters into his work: poetry, social justice, scientific literacy, & a deeply abiding humanism are all on plain display in his art.

#### Hearing Loop

The sanctuary has a Hearing Loop System which is an ADA approved technology that transmits sound wirelessly directly to hearing aids. If you wear hearing aids and your T-coil is activated, you can pick up the signal from the sound system (if you have hearing aids, but your T-coil is not activated, please speak with your audiologist). There are also sound amplifying headphones (available on the credenza in the Parlor or from one of the ushers) if you do not have hearing aids but could benefit from amplified sound.

#### January News from the Board of Trustees
